Ms. Maria Luisa Acosta has a Juris Doctor, obtained through a Fulbright Scholarship, a Masters in Comparative Law, a Masters in Natural Resources and Environmental Issues, and a postgraduate course in regional autonomy and public administration; She has deeply and extensively studied and applied –litigating, teaching and drafting reports - constitutional law, domestic legislation, and the International Human Rights Law, all focused on indigenous peoples.

Besides that, for almost three decades, the candidate has worked closely with indigenous leathers and their authorities, acting on their behalf and their communities, before local, regional, national, and international institutions.

The same way, she has counseled them in negotiations with national and international corporations, and governmental institutions. Moreover, Ms. Acosta has accompanied indigenous peoples in their technical processes of land tenure, natural resources access, livelihood and cultural issues; for example, She has performed as member of an interdisciplinary team, created to assist the Rama and Kriol peoples in the titling process of their land, obtaining the state recognition of a half o million hectares of land in the Caribbean Coast in 2009.

Last, but not least, Ms. Acosta has excellent intercultural communication skills in Spanish and in English.

The candidate has been working in the field of international human rights, since 1993, performing as the national lawyer in the Case of the Mayangna (sumo) Indigenous Community of Awas Tingni v. Nicaragua (2001) such experience, introduced her into the regional Inter-American System for the Protection of Human Rights (IASHR); since then, Ms. Acosta has taken several cases into the Inter-American System.

As advocator for the human rights of indigenous peoples she has supported young indigenous women leaders to participate into the United Nations Permanent Forum on Indigenous Issues (UNPFII).

Ms. Acosta interacts with different special mechanisms of the United Nations - the Human Rights Council, the Special Procedures and the Treaty Monitoring Bodies- particularly with several UN Special Rapporteurs such as the ones: on the rights of indigenous peoples, on human rights and the environment, on minority issues, and on the situation of human rights defenders.

The candidate has also drafted reports for different Treaty Monitoring Bodies such as the Committee on the Elimination of Racial Discrimination (CERD) and the Committee on Economic, Social and Cultural Rights (CESCR). Dear Sir or Madam,

I am honored to apply for a position within the Expert Mechanism on the Rights of Indigenous Peoples (EMRIP), as its member from Central and South America, and the Caribbean; because of my ample professional experience and expertise in the field of the human rights of indigenous peoples in this sociocultural region.

During my professional carrier -28 years- I have functioned as a human rights lawyer specialized in indigenous issues, work that I have carried out performing as: Law Professor, Coordinator of the Center for Legal Assistance to Indigenous Peoples (CALPI) -a nonprofit organization-, and as Independent Consultant.

I have accompanied Indigenous and Afro-descendants peoples of Nicaragua in their calim, diagnosis, administrative procedures and implementation of the demarcation and titling processes, of their traditional territories -which constitute their livelihoods, sources of their culture, worldview and spirituality.

As university law professor - nationally and internationally- I have imparted: constitutional, autonomy, environmental and international human rights law, emphasizing on the rights of indigenous peoples.

As CALPI's Coordinator, I have litigated in the Inter-American System for the Protection of Human Rights (IASHR), cases such as: Acosta at al v. Nicaragua, and Case No. 13,615 –on the issue of the lack of Prior, Free and Informed Consent- and the Transocenic Canal of Nicaragua corrently at The Inter-American Commission on Human Rights (IACHR).

And, as Independent Consultant, I was part of a drafting committee of a law bill for the rights of the indigenous peoples of the Pacific, Central and North regions of Nicaragua; and for the bill of Law 445 -approved in 2003- which establishes the administrative procedure for granting the titles of the 23 indigenous and Afro-descendant territories of the Caribbean Coast of Nicaragua, with an area that represents 31.16% of the national territory; and in the same capacity, I taught the Module on "Indigenous People, Communities and Peoples", within the Diploma in Justice for Groups in Vulnerability with a Gender Perspective, offered by the Federal Judicial Institute of Mexico and the Inter-American Institute of Human Rights (IIDH), imparted in several Mexican states in 2018 and 2020.

Recently –after one and a half year of work- we just finished the report: "Racism, Dispossession and Impunity", an analysis of the violence constituting torture and mistreatment of indigenous populations in Latin America; it was coordinated by the World Organization Against Torture (OMCT) and the Fray Bartolomé de Las Casas Human Rights Center (Mexico), in which I acted as member of a Working Group of researchers from Argentina, Bolivia, Chile, Colombia, Guatemala, Mexico, and Nicaragua.
