A published author & university lecturer who taught international law, human rights law, as well as several social science courses, related to the theory of universal human rights treaties, the rights of individual versus group, economics, and society, and related topics. Involved in major projects involving violations of various individual rights and in international law projects aimed at supporting vulnerable populations (e.g, women, children, refugees) as well supporting the rule of law and independence of judicial institutions. Awarded "Human Rights Guru" award in recognition of human rights expertise and extensive pro bono work in the human rights area as well as "I Met the Challenge" award. Skilled in negotiations, governance, and providing legal support for complex issues facing senior leadership in the context of international organizations, multinational corporations, as well as non-profit organizations.

As a legal advisor and counselor, I have experience in providing legal support for complex issues facing senior leadershiin a variety of international settings (ranging from NGOs to governmental organizations and multinational corporations). I am culturally aware and have worked with individuals of various nationalities and beliefs and am trained, as an anthropologist, in the methods of effective cross-cultural communication and analysis.

I have conducted extensive fieldwork in various countries and can engage with a variety of stakeholders effectively.

Having been trained in various quantitative and qualitative research methods, I can engage in a careful comparative analysis of complex issues and communicate results to appropriate stakeholders and to effectively advocate for the rights of handicapped.

My extensive work on the rights of women will allow me to integrate the gender perspective and my work with indigenous and ethnic groups should be invaluable in ensuring due respect for diversity while advocating for the access to water to all persons.

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III. MOTIVATION LETTER

I am uniquely suited for this position as I combine my passion for justice with the legal expertise coupled with being a trained economic anthropologist. I can analyze economic and social issues not only as a social scientist but as an experienced international attorney.

I have a demonstrated track record and have been involved with international human rights law for 30 years. My research has focused on the economic foundations of social complexity, access to subsistence resources and linkage to societal evolution. I advocated for and published on the topic of universality and indivisibility of human rights laws, even in the face of cultural relativism and human diversity. I believe that the best way to ensure protections for vulnerable groups and a continued access to critical resources, is to combine guarantees of legal rights with effective participation in a wider society.

Water is indispensable to life. Yet millions lack access to safe water and billions lack access to sanitation. Even when access rights legally exist, those lacking resources may lack the political and economic power to enforce them. Often the laws are not written to protect women and girls, two groups used as primary "beasts of burden" to procure water. Consequently, these girls and women are forced to miss out on an education and are vulnerable to predatory attacks en route to wells and rivers. Lack of safe water may impact basic health: we are seeing that very issue playing itself out in several tribal areas in the US one of the richest countries in the world - where water to wash hands and sanitize is not available even during the pandemic. Many indigenous groups, be it hunter-gatherers, pastoralists, or horticulturists, or tribal and ethnic groups existing within modern nation-state economies are systematically and structurally denied access to water. Many are pushed into increasingly marginal environments and face ever-growing barriers to preserve their territorial or cultural integrity. When we couple these trends with the on-going climate changes, deforestation, and desertification, the gravity of the current situation becomes apparent. We need to look at these issues comprehensively, we ingenious solutions and effective advocacy, and we need to address the local root causes.

The passing of the national implementing legislation is just the first step but not a sufficient one. Actual enforcement is necessary, especially when the reality on the ground and social differences in wealth and power make the implantation of laws nearly impossible. We must thus engage with local communities, researchers, scientists, judicial systems, and politicians, as well as with representatives of the civil society. A large part of advocacy involves finding culturally sensitive solutions to protect the rights of disenfranchised while making their rights be seen as culturaly legitimate.

I have the necessary skills, beside being multilingual and multicultural to conduct this work. While born in Poland, educated in the US, I worked and lived in various countries, from Latin America, to Europe, and Asia, conducting research and fieldwork and working as an attorney, gaining exposure to the full diversity of human conditions as well as judicial systems. I worked in major international law firms, with a multinational corporation, various universities, as well as engaged with public international organizations and NGOs, all of which gives me an indepth exposure and ability to effectively interact with diverse stakeholders, legal systems, and

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organizational cultures. Among others, I helped to analyze and create resource access programs for the US AID and I have proven negotiation skills: I was involved not only in major international large-scale commercial transactions but in negotiations with national and locallevel governments as well as with international organizations such as PAHO and WHO. I am deeply committed to the cause, fully independent, and willing to spent more than the required minimum time to ensure success in the role.
