CONTRIBUTION FROM THE WORKING GROUP ON THE USE OF MERCENARIES AS A MEANS OF VIOLATING HUMAN RIGHTS AND IMPEDING THE EXERCISE OF THE RIGHTS OF PEOPLES TO SELF-DETERMINATION

The Working Group on the use of mercenaries appreciates the careful attention of the Consultative Group and the Human Rights Council in selecting a new member for the Latin American and Caribbean states group.

In accordance with Human Rights Council resolution 5/1, paragraph 51 "the Consultative Group should take into account, as appropriate, the views of stakeholders, including the current or outgoing mandate-holders, in determining the necessary expertise, experience, skills, and other relevant requirements for each mandate".

It is the view of the Working Group that the new member should comply with the following pre-requisites:

- Enthusiastic and collegiate candidate, with an explicit expertise on issues related to mercenaries, mercenary-related activities or private military and security companies. Knowledge and experience of human rights and International Humanitarian Law.

- An understanding of the nature of the private military and security industry, conflict and postconflict settings and transitional justice is desirable, beyond broad security topics. Knowledge of issues relating to business and human rights, would be welcome but is not essential.

- A commitment to a victims-centred and intersectional approach in the work undertaken. Familiarity with the recent thematic priorities and work of the Working Group on the use of mercenaries including issues related to natural resources and extractive industry, new manifestation of mercenaries, gender, migration, cyber-security, and PMSC in humanitarian context. A strong network of contacts regionally and internationally is desirable.

The Working Group welcomes the Human Rights Council and the Consultative Group's consideration of their inputs and remains available to offer additional specific and candidate-based information for this selection process.
