

For 30 years, the United Nations Voluntary Fund for Victims of Contemporary Forms of Slavery has helped hundreds of thousands of victims to recover from slavery and rebuild their lives. Since its establishment, the Fund has channelled more 8.8 million dollars to more than 800 projects.

Beneficiaries include victims of forced and bonded labour; domestic servitude; traditional slavery; sexual slavery, and trafficking for the purpose of sexual or labour exploitation; sale of children, commercial sexual exploitation of children, and the use of children in armed conflict; early and forced marriage; and the worst forms of child labour.

## **IMPACT ON THE GROUND**

The Fund channels voluntary contributions to civil society organizations, including grassroots and victims' associations, assisting slavery survivors. Services include health care, shelter and food, legal representation, vocational training, education, and income-generating support. This operational approach complements the work of other United Nations mechanisms combating slavery. In 2020, the Fund received \$848 419 from 9 Member States.

## **ACCOUNTABLE MANAGEMENT**

- » Managed by the United Nations Human Rights Office
- » Grants awarded on the advice of an independent board of trustees
- » Projects evaluated and monitored on the ground by field presences

## **HOW OUR GRANTEES WORK**

- » In Brazil, the Centro de Defensa de la Vida y los Derechos Humanos Carmen Bascarán rescues, and provides food and medical care to 100 victims of trafficking and forced labour in agriculture.
- » In Bosnia and Herzegovina, Novi Put has a 24-hour hotline, and provides counselling, legal and reintegration services to 30 Roma children victims of trafficking for sexual exploitation, forced marriage, forced begging and domestic servitude.
- » The Preda Foundation rescues, houses and represents in court 30 children victims of commercial sexual exploitation in the Philippines.
