Our country visits provide us with opportunities to review the human rights records of various countries and ascertain best practices and challenges in the area of racial discrimination. I am affiliated with the work of two non-governmental organisations, Jamaicans for Justice and Jamaica's 51% Coalition, that lobby for gender justice in
