#### **Excellencies, Ladies and Gentlemen,**

Global human development is on course to decline for the first time since 1990. A recent UNDP <u>study</u> found that the pandemic could push the total number of people living in extreme poverty to over one billion by 2030<sup>1</sup>.

The pandemic curtailed a wide range of basic human rights. Whilst many measures were necessary to tackle the pandemic head-on, the pandemic has exacerbated exclusion and highlighted inequalities and there is a disproportionate impact on certain groups who are <u>affected differently</u>.

<u>Responses to the pandemic that respect human rights</u> will result in *better outcomes* in beating COVID-19. Working with UN Country Teams, UNDP is co-leading the socio-economic response to COVID-19 and is taking a <u>human rights-based approach to COVID-19 response</u> that puts people at the centre of the recovery. It is based on the principles of participation and inclusion; accountability and the rule of law; as well as non-discrimination and equality. In doing so it is critical that we limit backsliding on progress toward both SDG 10 on addressing inequalities and SDG 16 on supporting peaceful, just and inclusive institutions which are both central to build forward better.
