Thank you for the floor,

Excellencies, colleagues,

It's a pleasure to be here today. We recognize that LDC and SIDS participation is important in the Council. SIDS make up a Fifth of the UN membership. Together, LDCs and SIDS represent 40% of UN Member States. But we are not the voices traditionally heard on the Human Rights Council.

What makes the LDCs/SIDS Trust Fund great, and what exemplifies the role we can play is the participation, engagement and even the activism of the diplomats who come to Geneva.
