Statement by Myanmar Delegation

During Panel Discussion on Item 5: Minority youth: agents of change for peace and stability

at United Nations Forum on Minority Issues Geneva, 1st December 2017

Mr. President,

- My delegation wishes to express our appreciation to all the panelists for sharing their experiences and knowledge on the issues of youth's involvement in peace building and conflict prevention.
- As Myanmar has suffered 60 years of civil armed conflict, we pay great attention to internal peace and improvement of lives of the people as our national priorities.
