Some domestic workers live in the backyard of the employer home, have no access to family or friends

Many domestic workers faces struggle of another kind, physical and sexual abuse.

Migrant D. Workers as Minority Workers

These workers often lack the ability to fight against the employer as they face or fear being send back to their countries and thus they cannot afford as they left these countries due to

poverty.
