Dear Commissioner Reynders,

The <u>United Nations Working Group on the issue of human rights and transnational corporations and other business enterprises</u> ("Working Group") welcomes the opportunity to submit feedback as part of the <u>public consultation on the European Commission's sustainable corporate governance initiative</u>, covering corporate human rights and environmental due diligence.

As part of this process, we are re-submitting the attached recommendations from the Working Group regarding the initiative's alignment with the <u>UN Guiding Principles</u> on <u>Business and Human Rights</u>. These recommendations were originally sent to your office on 22 October 2020 and continue to express our key inputs regarding both the content of the proposed legislation and the process of developing that content.

In addition, the Working Group welcomes the <u>European Parliament's recent</u> adoption of the draft legislative initiative by the Committee on Legal Affairs, calling on the Commission to urgently present a sustainable corporate governance law. We are pleased to see many of the Working Group's below recommendations echoed in this call. We also add here our support for the Committee's further recommendations regarding a ban on importing products linked to severe human rights violations such as forced or child labor and inclusion of such a ban in trade and sustainable development chapters of EU trade agreements.

We continue to support the European Union's efforts to institute mandatory measures that drive the State duty to protect human rights, the business responsibility to respect human rights, and access to effective remedy for victims of business-related human rights harms – the three pillars of the Guiding Principles. As highlighted in our attached recommendations, we would like to reiterate the importance that the new law in particular considers issues of vulnerable groups, including human rights risks in relation to gender, Indigenous Peoples, human rights defenders, religious and ethnic minorities, racial discrimination, and LGBTI+ issues.

In conclusion, the Working Group would be delighted to engage further with you and your colleagues in the near future relating to our shared interest in promoting good
