

Ursula Tracy Doyle is a Professor of Law at Salmon P. Chase College of Law (Chase), Northern Kentucky University. She teaches public international law, international criminal law, professional responsibility, remedies and torts.

Ursula researches the use of international law in U. S. domestic courts; business and human rights; the institutional capacities of the United Nations; the human rights demands of transitional justice; and the life of the lawyer, diplomat, academic and politician Patricia Roberts Harris. Ursula has presented her work domestically and internationally. She has published in *Buffalo Human Rights Law Review*, Case Western Reserve Journal of International Law, Hastings Law Journal and Howard Law Journal.

Before joining Chase, she taught at Howard University School of Law, in Washington, D.C. and practiced law in the areas of mass torts and complex litigation. She was a law clerk to the Honorable Theodore A. McKee, U.S. Court of Appeals for the Third Circuit, in Philadelphia, PA. Ursula has also taught at Morehouse College, in Atlanta, GA, and the University of Alabama in Huntsville, amongst other institutions.

Ursula is a graduate of Cornell University, Ithaca, NY (A.B., English), Columbia University, New York, NY (M.A., English) and Indiana University Maurer School of Law (J.D.). She has also studied in Colombia, France and Italy.
