1. Stocktaking of six years of the mandate: survey and event

4. Privatization and UN Special Rapporteurs

After the outbreak of the COVID19 pandemic, I adapted my mode of working and interacted and spoke in many online events during this period, organized by myself, civil society organizations, international organizations and governments. This change in mode of communication allowed me to interact with several stakeholders in different parts of the world and to reach out a great number of people. Among the interesting events that I attended, I would highlight the "Enough is enough: privatization and public services". This event was unprecedented in that 9 former, current and newly appointed Special Rapporteurs have gathered in one event and discussed one cross-cutting issue that

applies and relates to all different mandates: the privatization of public services from a human rights perspective".



5. Introducing the next Special Rapporteur on the human rights to water and sanitation

I have the pleasure to announce that the Human Rights Council <u>appointed</u> Mr. Pedro Arrojo as my successor. With his extensive work with human rights defenders, on conservation of water and on water conflicts that affect human rights of communities in vulnerable situations, Pedro will bring new perspectives for the development of the human rights to water and sanitation. I am sure that Pedro Arrojo meets all the requirements to contribute to the realization of the human rights to water and sanitation worldwide. I wish him a fruitful and smooth tenure and ask you all to collaborate with him, joining forces for the success of the third Special Rapporteur.

6. My final remarks as the Special Rapporteur on the human rights to safe drinking water and sanitation

In this final communication, I would like to express my enthusiastic thanks to all the support I have received over the past six years. Without the engagement of hundreds of actors with the mandate, the impact of my work certainly would have been much more limited. I am thankful to each and everyone of you for the interactions we had during my tenure of the Special Rapporteur on the human rights to safe drinking water and sanitation and I hope to continue this valuable relationship with many of you in my other capacities.

Papua New Guinea, Highlands Pacific Limited, PanAust Limited, Canada, Australia (20 July 2020) - Concerning serious risks posed to the enjoyment of human rights of affected populations, in the context of risk of failure of a proposed tailings dam, and other issues arising from the hydroelectric/tailings dam, mine, waste discharge and associated infrastructure on the proposed Frieda River gold and copper mine and associated tailings dam ("Sepik Development Project") in Papua New Guinea. Response received from Canada 17 September 2020. Response received from Australia 16 September 2020.

DNB ASA, KfW IPEX-Bank GmbH, Banco de Crédito e Inversiones e Chile, Itaú CorpBanca Head Office, US International Development Finance Corporation, International Finance Corporation, Banco Interamericano de Desarrollo, Chile (18 August 2020) - Concerning possible violations of the right to water in relation to two economic development projects: the run-of-river hydropower plant in Alto Maipo, in the Cordillera province, and the avocado monoculture in the province of Petorca. Response received from DNB ASA on 14 October 2020. Response received from KfW IPEX-Bank GmbH on 15 October 2020. Responses received from Chile on 16 October 2020 (1, 2, 3, 4, 5).

India (31 August 2020) - Concerning the draft notification "Environment Impact Assessment Notification, 2020", issued by the Ministry of Environment, Forests and Climate Change, which, if published, will supersede the Environment Impact Assessment notification dated the 14th September, 2006 and its subsequent amendments.
