Theme: The Second International Decade for People of African Descent: Addressing Systemic Racism,

Reparatory Justice, and Sustainable Development

Tuesday 16 April 2024

Thank you, Madam Chair.

First, the delegation of Trinidad and Tobago extends warm congratulations to Dr. Soomer on her

appointment as Chair of the Forum. We also align with the statement delivered on behalf of

CARICOM Delegations in Geneva.

Undoubtedly, Chair, 2024 represents a key inflection point in the pursuit of reparatory justice. As

we approach the end of the International Decade of People of African Descent, and pursue

heightened advocacy for a second International Decade, the centrality of a reparatory justice

framework as a basis for dismantling the legacies of slavery is undeniable.

Against the backdrop of growing calls for reparatory justice, including by UN experts last month, on

the occasion of the International Day of Remembrance for the Victims of Slavery and the

Transatlantic Slave Trade, my delegation recognises the critical work undertaken by the Permanent

Forum, Member States and key stakeholders since the second session in 2023.

The Caribbean Community (CARICOM), in particular, has continued to play a leading role in these

discussions on reparatory justice, among others, as elaborated for example, in the region's 10-Point

Action Plan for reparatory justice. We also attach importance to the Bridgetown Initiative, as we

view meaningful reform of the international financial architecture as indispensable for addressing

structural inequalities and economic paradigms that have long hindered our pursuit of sustainable

development and the wellbeing of our people.

Trinidad and Tobago, as a member of CARICOM, remains committed to advancing this cause given the nexus between the calls for reparatory justice in the form of social and economic compensation and development, on the one hand, and the pursuit of sustainable, and inclusive, development on the other. In this connection, we encourage consideration of the outcomes of the Accra Reparations Conference in November 2023. We also highlight, in this regard, the existence of the reconstituted Trinidad and Tobago National Committee on Reparations, and we reiterate the calls made by our

As converging global crises continue to disproportionately affect People of African Descent, the opportunity must be seized to address, frontally, systemic challenges. The discussions during this session will no doubt provide a sound framework for such.
