Operationalizing the Right to Development in measuring progress beyond GDP

The right to development supports a new system of measurement that includes indicators referring to **all dimensions of development** as a human right: civil, cultural, economic, political, social, and environmental.

Based on the right-to-development principles of

- the duty to cooperate,
- self-determination of rights-holders,
- protection of rights holders currently excluded from mainstream development, and
- · common but differentiated responsibilities,

a new measurement system should:

- enable monitoring of external assistance that a State provides or receives;
- allow space for localization, enabling rights holders to pursue their own development path;
- have access to data on societal groups less able to participate in the fair distribution of the benefits resulting from development;
- include measures that ensure its use will contribute to an enabling international environment, including concessional financing, development cooperation, and technology transfer.

GDP remains important as an **indicator of the resource base** of a State. Those with low resource availability face serious obstacles to the realization of the right to development and other human rights. **International cooperation** is essential to provide them with appropriate means and facilities to foster their sustainable development.
