

## Statement :

terms, is the benefit to their homes and their communities.

The migrants are sources of development in their country of origin for example, in Asia or some countries in Africa or even Europe when we look at the areas that are more populated by migrants typically are more developed than others and their families are enjoying their rights bcz of the migrants. It's a positive contribution to the enjoyment of human rights. But the negative part is. I met many people who were affected by this conflict, and they left because their cities have been bombarded and they needed shelter, it's beautiful to see all of most Eu nations host migrants in their houses and it's wonderful to have this positive reaction.
